Competition Rules/Guidelines

 You are required to provide and prepare a suitable dog within the time frame laid out.

- Unnatural colouring of dogs is only permitted in creative Styling class
- Time limits for all 6 classes are 2 hours for dogs up to 18 inches. Dogs over 18 inches and any hand-strip are allowed 2 & 1/2 hrs.
- Competitors must supply and are responsible for all their own equipmentincluding tables, clippers, blades etc
- You are responsible for any dog you bring along. This includes a cage where
 required and cleaning up any mess made by your dog in or in the surrounds of the competition building. A separate cage area is provided so please
 use it.
- Dogs presented for all classes should be freshly washed (note hand-strip class only if required) & dried and totally tangle free.
- Pre competition trimming allowed extends to groin, hygiene area and under pads.
- Ears, nails, anal glands and de-matting should be attended to as part of the pre-competition preparation before you reach the venue
- Remember the amount of coat growth is suggested as a guideline, this can differ with the individual dog. Some dogs may need more time than the guidelines and some less. You want to have enough coat to be able to work with and to show your skills.
- The results of Classes 1 & 2 will be announced on Saturday.
- The results of classes 3,4,5 &6,"Individual Dog" trophy and Overall Irish Groomer of the Year, Best International & Best in Show will be announced on Sunday after all judging has been completed
- Judges decisions will be final. Marks are given for preparation, taking note of
 whether the dog is clean and well presented with nails and ears done prior to
 entering the competition. Neat and tidy clipping lines will carry good marks as
 will good technique and finish with scissoring and hand stripping. The suitability of the trim for the dog will be taken into account. Balance and shape are
 also very important.

 Classes 1-3 will be sub-divided into Open and Champion sections. Places 1st to 3rd will be awarded in each section. If you have won this class previously you must enter the Champion section.

- To be eligible for the **Irish Groomer of the Year** you must enter 2 of classes 1-3; open or champion level, and be working as a groomer on the island of Ireland
- The Novice Class is open to competitors who have not been previously placed in previous IPDGA
 competitions (with the exception of the Heiniger Career Start). It is aimed at newcomers to grooming
 by which is meant less than 3 years in the industry.
- Heiniger New to Grooming. Participants in this class must provide & use a Heiniger clippers during this class. (IMPORTANT: Clippers presented on the day will not be available for use in the class) They are responsible for supplying all their own equipment including table and post. Entrants must be grooming for no more than 1 year and have not competed before.
- Creative Styling Class is open to all groomers. Anything goes (example- colours/shaping/props
 etc) as long as the dogs welfare is not affected or compromised. If any dye or other colouring is
 been done at the venue it is IMPERATIVE THAT THE FLOOR AREA IS COVERED BY A LARGE
 PLASTIC SHEET.
- The "Individual Dog Trophy" is open to competitors who just compete in one of the classes 1-3, open or champion section.
- To be eligible for the International Trophy, the groomer must live and work outside the island of Ireland. Our International competitors are to be awarded separate 1st to 3rd placings within the Clipped, Scissored and Handstrip classes. A "Best International" will then be decided.
- Best in Show will then be decided between Irish Groomer of the Year and Best International.
- No casual entries accepted on the day.

- Generous prizes are supplied by our class sponsors (updated as confirmed on our website) along
 with rosettes and trophies for the winners to keep, supplied by the Association. Some of the class
 winners are presented with a perpetual Trophy, which is to be returned prior to the following year's
 competition complete with the winners name for perpetuity.

Extra notes for 1st time competitors

 Please note that the thorough preparation of your dog prior to the competition can make a huge difference to your placing within a class.

- Carefully read and follow the guidelines laid out in this leaflet and if you have any queries please ask a committee member for guidance.
- If you are doing a breed with a fluffy coat it should be spotlessly clean & blow-dried straight to allow you to get the best finish you can.
- If you are preparing your dog the night before, once prepared your beautiful hound needs to be kept clean overnight - a crate can be useful here.
- If feet get wet/dirty while toilet needs are being attended to then they should be cleaned and/or re blow dried.
- Your dog must be parasite free.
- Any knots, tangles and mats are all to be got rid of in the preparation prior to the competition.
- At the end of your allotted time in the class the judge will expect
 you to clear hair and equipment off your table. You need to stand/
 stack your dog properly to show it off to its best. Competitors usually use a table cloth for this. A plain one that contrasts with the
 dogs colour is best.

Should we have a common De-Matting Policy to display in our salons? Here is a sample - views welcome

Our policy is to groom humanely. We will attempt to de-mat a coat if we feel that the animal will not suffer pain. .

It is the owners duty of care towards their pet, to maintain their pets coat between professional groomings. If owners fail to attend to their pets coat, then in the interests of the animal, we will shave off a matted coat, to prevent unnecessary suffering due to neglect.

We will be more than happy to show you how to look after your dogs coat. Please note: our normal grooming charge does not include de-matting, any possible de-matting may be charged for as an extra.

When a dog is presented to us in a severely matted condition, it is our policy to shave the whole coat using electric clippers with a close blade. To de-matt would cause the animal tremendous stress and discomfort, often leaving a very thinned and damaged coat. Shaving the coat is quicker and more gentle on the animal. Many animals are traumatised by unnecessary hours of de-matting, putting them off grooming for life. We consider shaving an act of kindness.

A SEVERELY MATTED DOG CAN SUFFER MANY CONDITIONS

- Hotspots & sores
- Fungal & bacterial infections
- Yeast infections
- Flea infestation
- Moist eczema
- Mites & lice
- Maggot infestation
- Urine & faeces scalding
- Eye & ear infections
- Severe itching

Once the coat is removed, the skin can be red due to the lack of air circulation and dirt that has accumulated underneath. Occasionally there are sores or infection, this may need veterinary treatment. Dogs tend to scratch and rub their skin after shaving - this is normal, however some can over scratch and this may lead to broken skin. If in doubt speak to your vet

Juggling Grooming and Mothering

I've two girls a 5 year old and a 21 month old. I was really lucky in that I had really healthy pregnancies and was able to work right up to the day on both babies with my hubby doing a lot of the bathing. I took on someone then just to wash and dry and some prep work after I came out of hospital. I managed to get back doing a few dogs about a week after each of the girls were born but it was mainly trimming only, as I had Cathriona to wash and dry. I was down on income a bit as had to pay her but at least my

clients weren't going elsewhere. I breastfed and co-slept with both my babies so my sleep wasn't too disturbed and I also had my child-minder come to the house for the first year so I was able to just run inside to feed or pump while Cathriona worked on the dogs and I just had to finish them then. The fact that I work from home was also a bonus now as I think back. My working week is usually 3/4 days so I wasn't under too much pressure with dogs lined up out the door! It worked out really well for me and

with that extra bit of support we all managed quite well!! Anyone who's thinking about having a bambino go for it!! Don't worry or put yourself under too much pressure, baby always comes first but it can be done with that bit of extra help!

Thanks to Audrey Hayes

I decided to keep the grooming salon open when I fell pregnant and had my little boy Ethan. When I fell pregnant I had a girl working with me doing all the washing and drying and that worked out well. I trained her in and things were going great and about 4 months into the pregnancy she came in one day and told me that " She too was pregnant and would have to leave after 6months or so. I couldn't believe it and was so worried I wouldn't find anyone else. Luckily though, after advertising on the ipdga page, I got a quick response from another groomer looking for work. I trained her in over a four month period and was really pleased with her work so had the two girls working opposite days to each other and I worked alongside one of them right up to about 8 months. For the

last month I just kept an eye on things and finished heads. I had Ethan in November and only shut for 2 weeks. The girls re-opened the salon and worked away until one of them left to have her baby and the other kept things going while I took time out for 7 months. It was so great to have the time off and keep the salon open but I was constantly juggling baby and the salon. It was hectic. Also the customers were constantly texting me about appointments when I was off which was really difficult in the first few weeks after having baby. Looking back If I were to go again, I would probably shut for at least 8-10 weeks and take the much needed time out to rest and not have to think about the salon. Also, I learned in the year after that some of my customers weren't that happy with some of the grooms from one of the girls. As much as I

tried to make sure the standard of the grooming was high when you're not constantly in the room it's impossible to know for sure. I now work part-time, 3 days a week and Ethan goes to Creche 2 of those days. I have a new girl washing and drying and we get through between 18 and 21 dogs over the 3 days. I spend Mondays and Fridays with Ethan and feel I have a good work life balance. The only thing you will battle with juggling baby and work is the tiredness but would I do it all over again? Absolutely. It can and does all work out

Thanks to Jean Gregg

I stopped grooming before baby arrived and I got most of my regulars in for a groom or a top up. I also let people know when I would be back grooming and yes they did have to go somewhere else for at least one groom but that's what I had to do. Generally people get 6 months I took 3. I wasn't fussed on once a year guys looking to get a groom tomorrow!! I looked after regulars didn't go into lifting big dogs straight away as my pelvic floor wouldn't allow it so I suppose you have to think should I take on a helper?? Part timer ?? Will I keep then salon going with some one else while I'm gone ??I had my baby in November thought I might open again for Xmas but night feeds every 3 hours, dictated other wise so give yourself chance don't make any promises if baby, God forbid, gets sick etc grooming dogs won't be on your mind


